Wood County/Portage County Trails Explained

(One of the most requested items we are asked)

We tend to get some questions wondering what it means if Portage or Wood County trails are open. Sometimes one opens before the other. Riders wonder what it means because our trails are on the border of both counties. Let's explain for clarity. It is true we have trails in both counties. We have about 28 miles considered Wood County miles and 18 considered Portage County miles. I'll do my best to explain, please review the Wood and Portage County maps as we go!

Our Wood County Trails are from the Wisconsin River by Anchor Bay south to the "North T" (south of Hwy 54 by Glenwood Road), then south to Kellner, through Kellner and south to the "South T" (south of Tower Rd and north of Oak St), then to Hwy 73 on the west side of County U towards Adams County. Since this section of trail travels primarily north and south, it also crosses County U (80th St.) many times. When it does this, you are physically going into and out of Wood and Portage Counties numerous times. However, none of this matters as you are on Wood County Trails only... even when you are in Portage County. The other section of WOOD county trails is from Kellner west to The Ridges and "The Kellner Loop" on 64th St.

Portage County trails are from the previous mentioned "T's" to the East. This includes the "North T" (near Glenwood Rd) east to Interstate 39 by Birch Ave and from the "South T" (between Tower Rd and Oak St.) east to The Wagon Wheel. So, when Wood County only is open and NOT Portage County... You can ride from the River to Adams County but NOT east of the "T's. When Portage only is open and NOT Wood, a rider can come from Portage County to the "T's" and no further. They would have to turn around and go back east. A rider cannot get to Kellner. I hope this helps shed some light on Portage and Wood County Trail definitions!

Lastly, we are holding nominations for officers of the club. We are always looking for anyone who might be looking to get involved. This is a great group of people to be involved with, you'll truly enjoy yourself while learning more about this great sport. Give it a try... terms are for only one year.
